Who is your truddy?

Your "truddy" is your Troop buddy group of three assigned during Troop meetings, field trips, swimming, and outdoor experiences. The truddy system is a great way to look after each other and stay safe. You can keep track of what your friends are doing, and they can do the same for you. Your Unit Leader may have a "truddy check." That means you need to make sure your three-friend-group is with you. It's a great way to share fun and exciting times together. Having a different group of three trusted friends for each event allows you to get to know everyone well. The truddy system also prevents any serious or harmful things from happening to you.

Journal your thoughts on the following: Whose perspective lines up the most with God's Word and His desire for freedom for His people? What false beliefs may have influenced these perspectives? How can you defend yourself from false beliefs to ensure your perspective on justice is aligned with Scripture? From this exercise, how can you advocate for those facing slavery today?

Present your findings to your Unit in either a first-person monologue as Sojourner Truth or work with a friend to act as an antebellum newspaper reporter and conduct an interview.
